Engagement Sessions:

Engagement sessions with me are designed to feel effortless and deeply personal. Rather than poses, I focus on guiding you into moments that allow your love to naturally unfold. I'll encourage you to slow down, be present with one another, and simply exist together while I quietly capture what's real with stolen glances, the gentle touches, the laughter that turns into something tender. My goal is to preserve the emotion you feel in this season of your love, creating images that don't just show how it looked, but how it felt.







Prepare For Your Engagement Session

Your session will take place during golden hour, the hour just before sunset. This light is:

- Soft, warm, and flattering
- Perfect for romantic, natural images
- Ideal for neutral tones and soft fabrics

Because of this lighting, warm and muted colors work especially well.



Tips for engagement prep

Pack 'em up

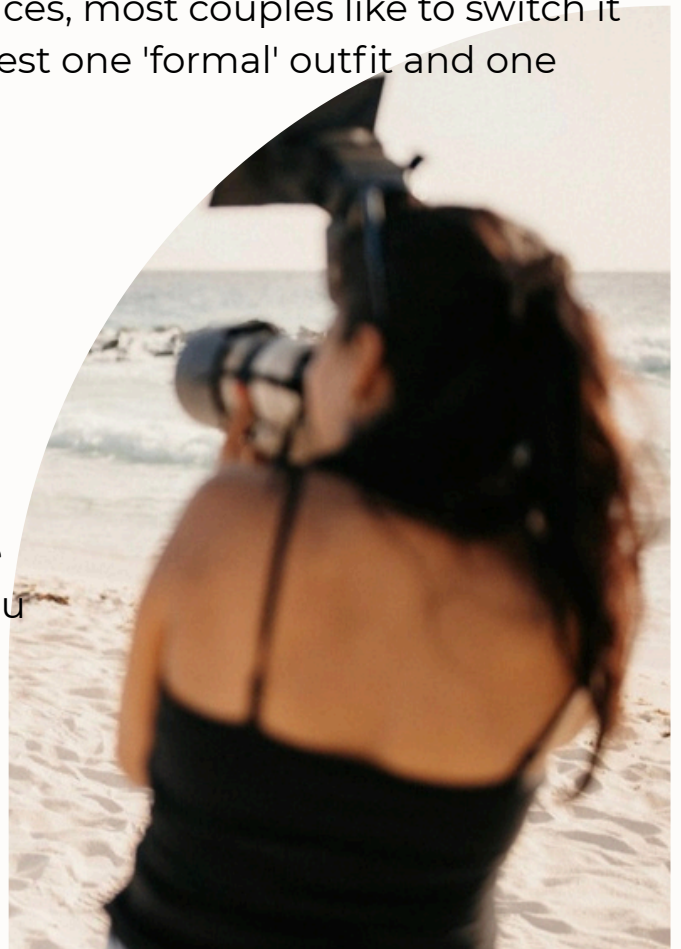
Bring all of the things that you might need! That includes makeup touchups, deodorant, water, snacks, whatever you need to maintain your fabulous-ness.

Bring an extra outfit

Your engagement package includes 2 outfits, so bring a change of clothes if you want to! Depending on your preferences, most couples like to switch it up for their second outfit. I typically suggest one 'formal' outfit and one 'casual' outfit for your session.

Props

Yes PLEASE bring all the props you want! Champagne (for those classic champagne pop shots), blankets, puppies, whatever you want to bring I am 100% down for.



What to Wear

Neutrals & Earthy tones work best!

You don't want your outfit to distract from you two awesome people! Oftentimes, a brighter color will reflect weird tones onto your skin. Neutral and earth toned outfits make photos a certain aesthetic that truly make you two pop! A little pop of colour is okay with accessories but you don't want it to take away from the real focus, which is YOU!

accessorize + layer

Add accessories like hats, scarfs, blankets, necklaces, your favourite shoes even, can add some fun looks to bringing out your personality during the session!



Get Glammed Up

Hair, Make-Up & Nails



I highly suggest scheduling your hair / makeup trial for the day of your session! Professional hair and makeup are not required for your engagement session, but many couples choose to have it done to feel confident and polished. A great option is using this session as your hair and makeup trial, allowing you to see how everything photographs and make any adjustments before the wedding day.

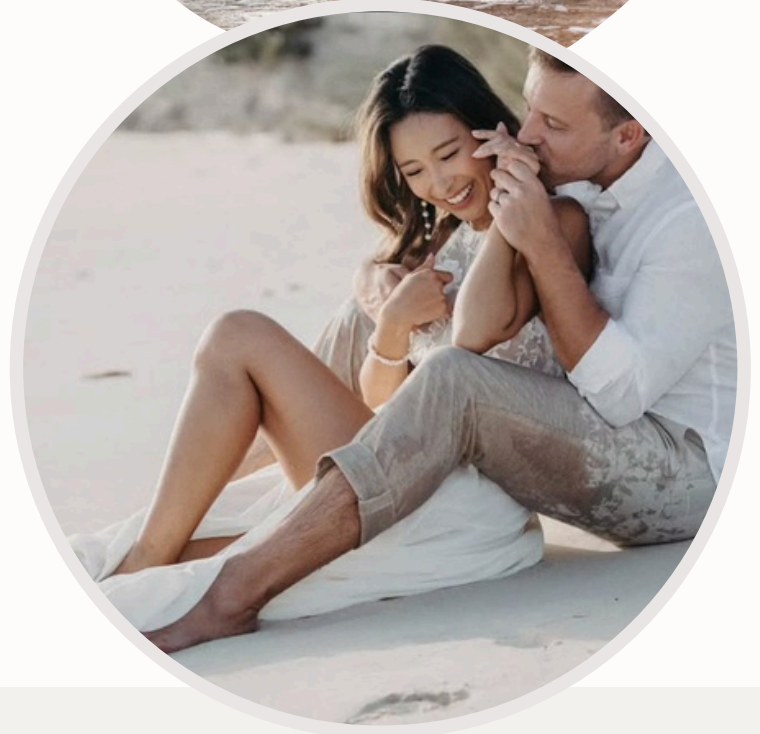
If you do opt for professional styling, aim for a look that feels like an elevated version of yourself. Soft, natural makeup and hair with movement tend to photograph timelessly and help you feel comfortable throughout the session.

Your hands will naturally be featured as you hold hands and show connection, so taking a moment to do your nails, even in a simple neutral tone, helps keep the focus on your engagement ring.

As always, choose what makes you feel like you. Comfort and confidence will always shine through in your photos.

Timelines are Important

Timelines are more than just a schedule. They are the framework that allows your wedding day to flow naturally, calmly, and beautifully. A thoughtful timeline ensures that there is space for every meaningful moment without feeling rushed, giving you the freedom to be present with each other and your loved ones.

With a clear timeline, we can plan for light, transitions, and emotional moments, capturing images that feel effortless and authentic. It helps prevent stress, keeps everyone on the same page, and ensures that nothing important is missed, from family portraits to candid interactions.

A well-planned timeline also allows for flexibility. Weddings rarely go exactly as imagined, but having a plan in place gives room to adjust while maintaining a sense of calm and structure. When your day has rhythm, the photography feels seamless, natural, and reflective of how it truly felt.

In short, timelines are essential because they create space for presence, connection, and timeless storytelling. They allow you to fully live your day while we capture every detail with care and intention.



Plan your photography timeline before your wedding planning timeline

Your photography-first timeline should be created before your wedding planner finalizes the full day schedule. Photography captures the moments that tell the story of your wedding day, and putting it first ensures that light, emotion, and connection are prioritized.

If we wait until the full planner's timeline is set, photography may be squeezed into limited windows, rushed, or scheduled during less flattering light. By planning photography first, we create breathing room for portraits, family photos, and candid moments, allowing your day to flow naturally.

Starting with a photography timeline also helps your planner design a schedule that supports both your vision and your story. It ensures that logistics, vendor timing, and transitions all work in harmony with how your day will be documented.



Timing

So the question is... how much time do you need? Oftentimes, my clients have no clue how much time to give for each event (which is totally understandable if you've never planned a wedding before!) Let's chat about how much time I'll need to get you the best photos possible.

You'll want to keep in mind that travel time might affect your timeline, so plan your travel between locations accordingly.



Lighting, and Sunset Timing

Golden hour is the brief window just after sunrise or before sunset and is one of the most magical times of day for capturing engagement and wedding photos. During this time, the sun sits low in the sky, creating soft, warm light that naturally flatters skin tones and adds a romantic glow to every image. Unlike harsh midday sunlight, golden hour light is gentle and diffused, helping to minimize shadows, squinting, and unflattering highlights.

For engagement sessions, golden hour creates an intimate, dreamy atmosphere that enhances genuine connection and emotion between couples. The warm hues and subtle backlighting add depth and movement, turning simple moments into timeless images. Whether walking hand in hand or sharing a quiet laugh, golden hour helps tell your love story in the most authentic and beautiful way.

On a wedding day, golden hour portraits of the bride and groom are often some of the most cherished images from the entire celebration. This time allows couples to step away briefly, slow down, and soak in the joy of being newly married while being photographed in the most flattering light possible. The result is romantic, cinematic images filled with emotion and the photos that feel as special as the moment itself.

Planning your timeline around golden hour ensures you receive stunning, timeless photographs that you'll treasure for a lifetime. It's more than just good lighting and it's the perfect blend of beauty, emotion, and artistry.



Weather Backup



Weather is one of the few things on your wedding day that is completely out of your control, but planning ahead ensures it won't impact the flow or mood of your celebration. Light rain, strong sun, or unexpected wind can all create challenges—but with preparation, they can also create beautiful, unique moments.

Having a backup plan for outdoor events is essential. Identify covered spaces, tents, or indoor options with your venue. Knowing where to pivot keeps your day calm and allows us to continue capturing meaningful moments without stress.

Flexibility is key. Even the most carefully planned day can have surprises. By building buffer time into your timeline, you allow for adjustments without feeling rushed. This flexibility ensures that everything from portraits to ceremony transitions happens smoothly.

Weather can even enhance your imagery. Soft rain can create romantic reflections, overcast skies provide beautiful even light for portraits, and golden hour sun can produce unforgettable glow. By staying adaptable, your photos will reflect the real, authentic day—rain, shine, or everything in between.

Ultimately, planning with flexibility and backup options ensures that your wedding day feels effortless. You can focus on connection, joy, and celebration, while I capture it all beautifully.

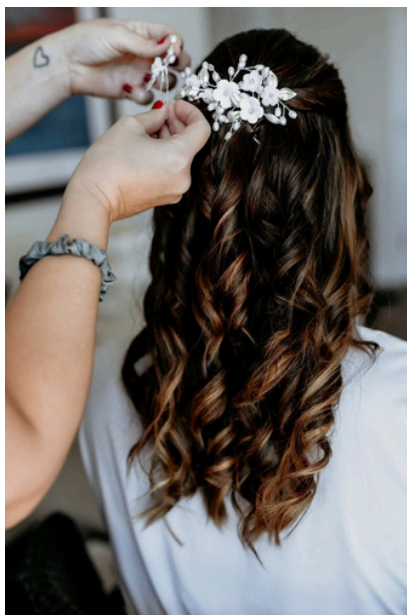
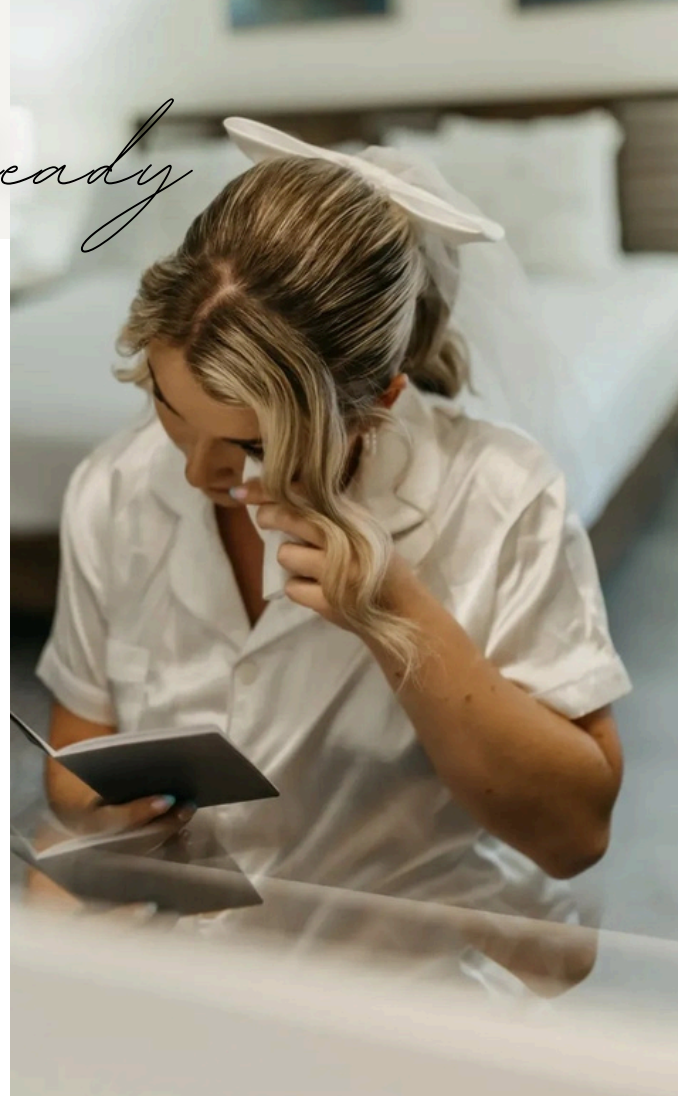
Getting Ready Photos on Your Wedding Day

Getting ready photos are an incredibly meaningful part of your wedding story, capturing the quiet, emotional moments before the day truly begins. These images document the anticipation, excitement, and heartfelt connections shared with your closest people before you walk down the aisle. From the final touches of hair and makeup to the deep breaths taken before slipping into your dress or suit, this part of the day is filled with raw, genuine emotion.

These moments often include some of the most touching interactions and parents seeing their child all dressed up for the first time, friends sharing laughter and happy tears, handwritten letters being read, or a quiet pause to reflect on what the day means. They help preserve the full experience of your wedding day, not just the ceremony itself.

Getting ready photos also allow your photographer to capture important details you may have spent months planning, such as your dress, shoes, rings, invitation suite, and personal heirlooms. These details help set the tone for your wedding gallery and create a beautiful, cohesive story from start to finish.

Beyond the images themselves, this portion of the day allows for a slower, more relaxed atmosphere, giving you time to ease into being photographed and feel comfortable before the big moment. When you look back at your wedding photos years from now, these images will remind you not only of how everything looked, but how it felt in those final moments before saying “I do.”



Groom Getting Ready

The groom's getting ready moments are just as meaningful as the bride's. This time is often quieter and more grounded, allowing the anticipation of the day to build naturally.

From putting on a suit or tuxedo to tying a tie or fastening cufflinks, these small moments capture character, style, and the calm before the celebration begins. Candid interactions with groomsmen, family, or close friends often provide some of the most relaxed and authentic images of the day.



Consider Lighting

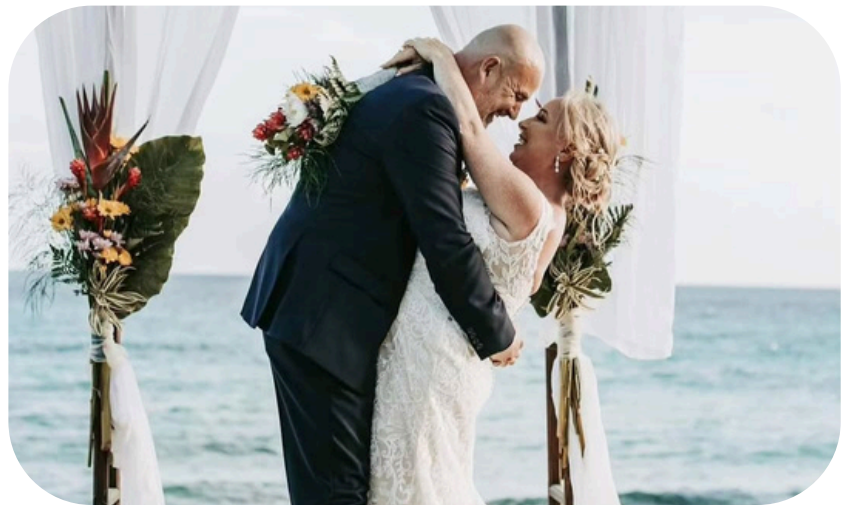
Lighting is KEY, especially when I'm capturing indoor events. For your getting ready photos, be sure to think about how the lighting will affect your images. A dark hotel room is going to be harder to photograph in, so consider having big windows near your getting ready space.



have a clean space

A clean, uncluttered space sets the tone for beautiful getting ready photos. Natural light, clear surfaces, and neutral surroundings allow the focus to stay on you and the moments unfolding. Before photography begins, take a few minutes to clear countertops, bedside tables, and floors of bags, food, water bottles, and extra clothing. Place personal items out of sight and gather anything you don't want photographed into one area.

A calm, intentional space not only photographs better, it helps the morning feel more relaxed and present.

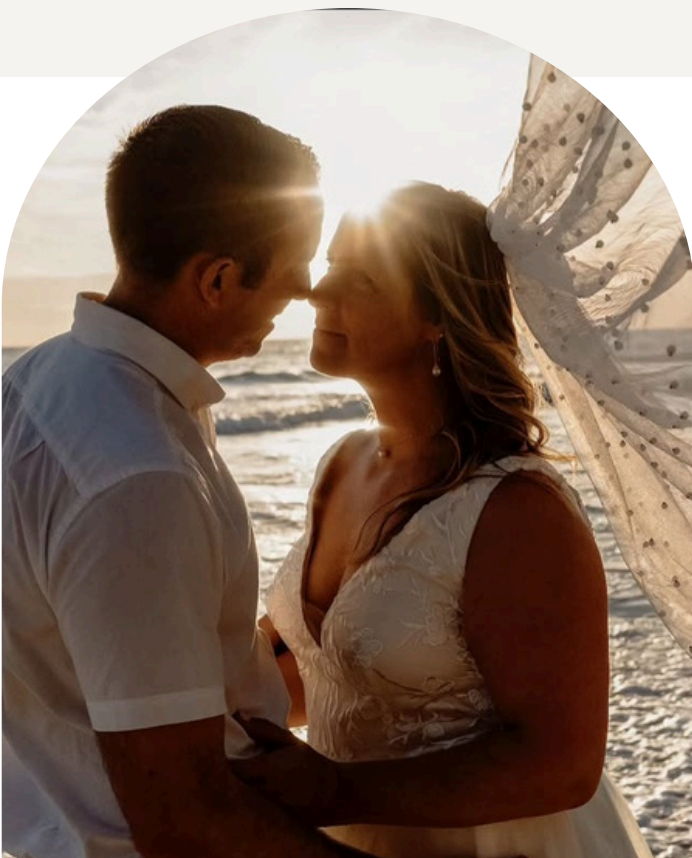

Other first Looks

A first look doesn't have to be only between the bride and groom. There are so many meaningful "firsts" on your wedding day that are worth capturing in a private, intentional way. Parent First Looks – Sharing a quiet moment with a parent before the ceremony can be deeply emotional and create some of the most memorable images of the day.

Sibling First Looks – If you have close siblings, seeing each other in your wedding attire for the first time can be a sweet and intimate experience.

Grandparent First Looks – These moments honor family and create lasting memories, capturing love across generations.

Wedding Party First Looks – For some couples, sharing a moment with their closest friends before the ceremony helps calm nerves, celebrate together, and get playful portraits early in the day.

These additional first looks allow you to connect privately, soak in emotion, and create images that tell the full story of your relationships. They also help your timeline flow more smoothly, giving us time for portraits without feeling rushed.



Couple's Portraits

One of my favorite moments of the entire wedding day is stepping away with the two of you after the ceremony to capture couple portraits during golden hour. This is usually the first quiet moment you'll have together as newlyweds and the nerves have settled, the ceremony has passed, and you can finally soak in the fact that you're married.







Wedding Party

Wedding party photos are an opportunity to capture the people who mean the most to you in a way that feels fun, relaxed, and authentic. These images celebrate friendships, family bonds, and the support system that surrounds you on your wedding day.

I approach these portraits with a balance of guidance and freedom. I will help organize poses and groupings efficiently, but I also encourage natural interaction, laughter, and movement. The goal is to reflect the personalities, energy, and connection of your wedding party rather than creating stiff, posed images.

Timing and location are key. We aim to capture these moments when light is flattering and energy is high, often before the ceremony or during a dedicated portrait session afterward. Keeping the session structured but flexible ensures that we get all the must-have shots without taking away from the flow of your day.

These photos become lasting memories of the people who celebrated with you, showcasing both individual personalities and the collective joy of your wedding party. By blending organization with spontaneity, we create images that feel editorial, emotional, and timeless.



Family Photos

Family photos are more than just a checklist on your wedding day. They are some of the most meaningful images you'll ever receive. These photos freeze a moment in time with the people who shaped you, raised you, supported you, and stood beside you long before this day arrived. Years from now, when life has changed and faces look different, these images become priceless reminders of love, legacy, and togetherness.

Family photos typically take place immediately following the ceremony. I'll have your family photo list ready during this time, and it's incredibly helpful to have someone who knows both sides of the family assist with calling out names and gathering people (this could be a sibling, maid of honor, or another trusted person).

If you prefer, family photos can also be done before the ceremony. If you choose this option, it's important that everyone is clearly informed of the time and location in advance so photos run smoothly.

If possible, I recommend asking your officiant to make a brief announcement after the ceremony, such as:

"Following the ceremony, the couple asks that all immediate family members please remain for family photos."

For anyone you'd like included in family photos, be sure to let them know ahead of time that they need to be present during this portion of the day and not wander off after the ceremony.

Ceremony



Your ceremony is the heart of your wedding day. It's the moment where everything becomes real. The quiet nerves, the deep breaths, the tears, the laughter, the promises you make to each other. This is the part of the day where you're fully present, surrounded by the people who love you most, committing your lives to one another. Long after the day has passed, your ceremony photos will bring you back to how it felt, not just how it looked.

Tips



- Take your time walking down the aisle. This is your moment. Slow steps allow you to soak it in and give space for beautiful, emotional photos.

- Hold hands during the ceremony when possible. It creates connection, calms nerves, and photographs beautifully.
- Be mindful of your officiant's positioning. Standing slightly off to the side helps keep your faces visible during key moments like vows and the first kiss.
- Share a private smile or deep breath together before the ceremony begins. It's grounding and often leads to the most genuine images.
- Practice your first kiss. A slow, natural kiss (not rushed) makes a big difference in how it photographs. you may want to ask your officiant to step to the side before pronouncing you as a couple. This way, they won't be in the background of your first kiss.

Unplugged Ceremony



An unplugged ceremony invites your guests to be fully present for one of the most meaningful moments of your day. With phones and cameras put away, the experience feels more intimate, emotional, and connected.

From a photography perspective, it also ensures clear views down the aisle, genuine reactions, and beautifully captured moments without distractions. If you choose an unplugged ceremony, be sure to let guests know ahead of time through signage, your wedding website, or a brief announcement from your officiant.

Reception

Your reception is where the celebration truly unfolds. This is the part of the day where nerves fade, laughter gets louder, and memories are made on the dance floor. Some of the most candid, joyful, and emotional moments happen here — the hugs, the speeches, the spontaneous dancing, and the quiet moments you share in between.

Scheduled events

Things to consider for your reception schedule are:

- entrances
- speeches
- toasts
- dinner
- first dances
- cake cutting
- bouquet toss
- dances
- sunset photos
- An exit



Reception Tips



- Consider being announced into your reception. It sets the tone and gets guests excited to celebrate with you.
- If you're doing speeches, keep them earlier in the evening while guests are seated and attentive. Short, heartfelt speeches photograph and feel the best.
- Plan a few minutes alone after your grand entrance or first dance to soak it all in together.
- Keep your dance floor close to the bar or main seating area. A full dance floor creates energy and amazing photos.
- Make sure your photographer eats while you eat. This keeps them energized and ensures smooth coverage throughout the evening.
- Trust your DJ or band to read the room and keep the momentum going.
- Schedule sunset or night portraits if timing allows — these often become favorite images from the day.
- Don't feel pressure to follow traditions that don't feel aligned. Your reception should reflect you.
- Most importantly, be present. Let go, dance, laugh, and enjoy every moment — that's when the magic happens.



Sunset photos capture more than just beautiful light. They capture emotion, connection, and the magic of your day. As the sun dips low, the warm, golden tones create a soft, romantic glow that flatters every moment and every detail.

This time of day also allows for intimacy and pause amid a busy wedding schedule. It's a moment just for the two of you, a chance to reflect on the vows you've exchanged, the love surrounding you, and the start of your new life together.

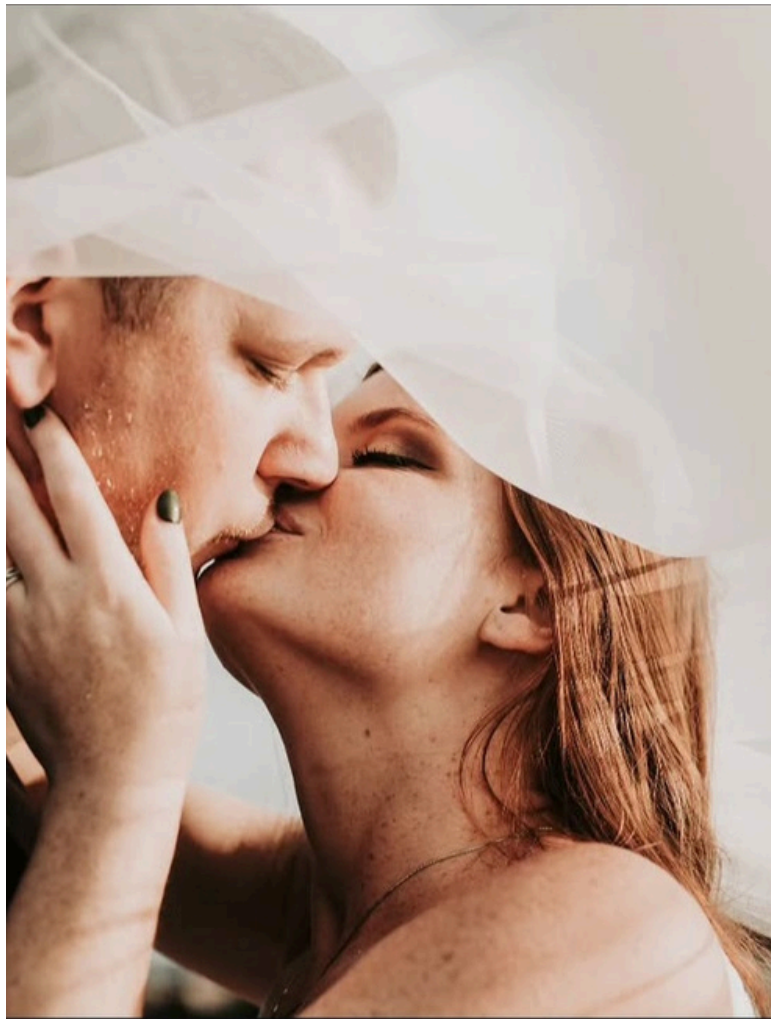

- Enjoy the moment: These photos are about connection and feeling, not perfection — laugh, hold hands, spin, or just breathe it in








